Cycling is permitted only on the gravel pathways that loop from the main entrances.

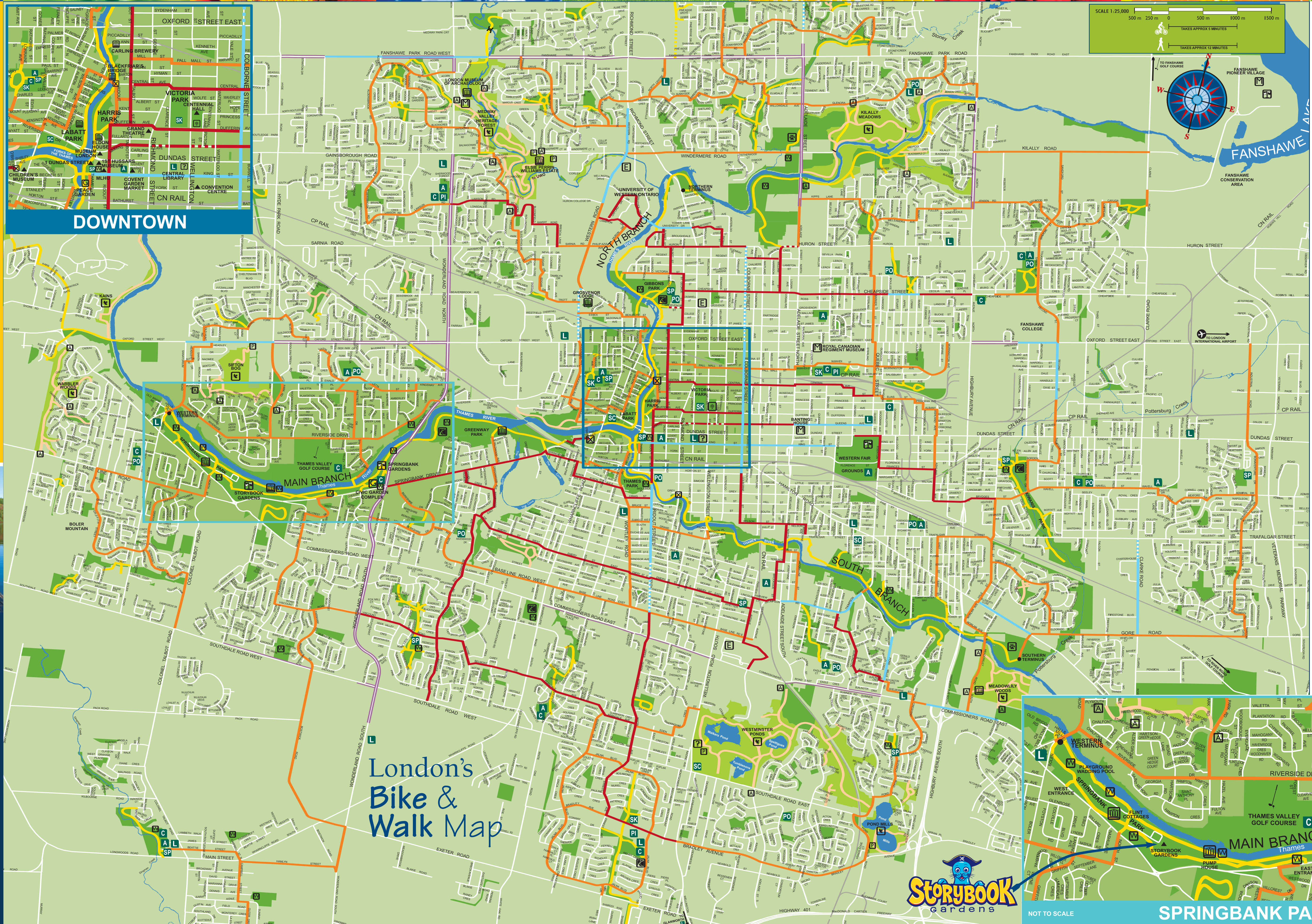
Do not cycle on the dirt pathways. These are for foot travel only. Watch for the signs.

DIRECTIONS AND DISTANCES FOR THE THAMES VALLEY PARKWAY (TVP)

The three branches of the TVP intersect at the Forks of the Thames River.

The North Branch follows the river through Harris Park and then Gibbons Park. It leads through the University of Western Ontario and ends at C F Ross Park at the East Broughs Bridge on Richmond Street.

The distance from the Forks of the Thames to the Northern Terminus is 5 kms.

The Main Branch leads west from the Forks of the Thames. The Main Branch follows the Thames River through Greenway Park past Springbank Gardens and Storybook Gardens and into Springbank Park. The path loops through Springbank Park ending at the bridge at Boler Road.

The distance from the Forks of the Thames to the Western Terminus is 8 kms.

If you choose the South Branch, you will travel east, past Thames Park and along the banks of the Thames River. This pathway showcases some of London's nature areas. The Southern Terminus ends just south of the Hamilton and Gore Road intersection.

The distance from the Forks of the Thames to the Southern Terminus is 8.5 kms.
